FROM THE INTERIM PASTOR

As we have been reflecting on the songs of Advent over the past few Sundays, the song *Gloria*, as depicted in Luke 2:14 is another song that invites our attention. In many ways the word “glory” defines God. God’s glory met Moses at the burning bush when God called Moses to lead the Hebrew people out of slavery. God’s glory (*Shekinah*) was visible in the pillar of cloud and fire that protected the Hebrews from Egyptian pursuers and led them through the wilderness. God’s glory suffused the newly built temple in Jerusalem. Now God’s glory dwelled in an infant embarking on a perilous journey. Those who choose to embrace Christ encounter God’s essence and are changed.


It is because of God’s glory come to earth that the angels sang, “And on earth peace among those whom he favors.” Jesus’ birth was the birth of peace. Reconciliation between humanity and God, without the need of an intermediary, became possible. This is the simple yet profound chorus sung at Messiah’s birth. Two lines of theological truth summarize the hopes of all seeking God’s redemption, starting with Hannah and extending to the end of time.

As we further look at the song’s meaning, we can assume the shepherds didn’t pause for theological reflection after the angels stopped singing. To them, the song and accompanying announcement meant an important baby was born, and that the event was so significant that God spoke directly with them (Luke 2:15). But we have the benefit of history to more fully discern the meaning of this short song.

First, we can comprehend God’s link with humanity. Both benefit through Jesus’ birth. God receives glory. We receive peace and God’s favor. God might be in highest heaven as the song says, and we might be on a tiny blue marble somewhere in the vast Milky Way, but Jesus’ birth links heaven and earth.

Second, we know that true peace is found in Jesus. Biblical peace is what Hebrews call “*shalom*.” *Shalom* is not merely an internal contentment, but a tranquility that pervades relationships and finds expression in concern for the welfare of others and in care for creation. It is a peace that transcends personal security and includes a yearning for all to be right with the world. Those who truly encounter Jesus’ peace will want that peace to spread globally. True peace that changes the world originates with Jesus. Peace

begins with repentance from sin and a restored relationship with God. Then it moves to a newly discovered ability to see others through the merciful eyes of God.

The song also changes hearts. The shepherds could not refrain from singing the song sung to them. As they left the stable, Luke tells us they glorified and praised God for all the things they heard and saw. When Paul met Christ on the Damascus road, he went from breathing murderous threats against Christians to teaching that Christ is the Son of God. Before Paul and Silas were arrested and sent to a Philippian prison, Lydia, a founder of the Philippian church, opened her heart to the gospel message. When the Philippian jailer witnessed the power of God after an earthquake opened the prison doors, but no one attempted escape, he immediately wanted to know how to be saved. The living reality of the song of the Christian faith changes lives.

Finally, this song changes values. People who embrace this song start looking at coworkers mercifully and seeking ways to love their enemies. They strive to further God's kingdom by sharing the gospel and by challenging oppression with compassion. It might best be described as a gracious lifestyle. God's abundant grace is irresistible and spills into others' lives, much like angels' melody.


